W: Hey, Craig. What are you looking at?

In ancient Rome, the cat became a symbol of liberty and was thought of as a guardian spirit. But during the Middle Ages in Europe, cats were linked to witchcraft and became a symbol of evil. As a result, countless numbers of cats were killed during this period. This may have contributed to the spread of the plague, the Black Death, which was carried by rat fleas. It was after the Middle Ages that cats regained their status as cute but deadly rodent exterminators. Now let's look at some pictures of cats.

13번 다음을 듣고, 20세 미국인들 중 화장실에서 휴대전화를 사용하는 비율을 고르시오.

M: So, in our last class, we talked a bit about the negative influence of cellphones on young people. In today's class, we'll take a look at how today's young Americans use their cellphones. This latest survey reveals that among Americans under 25, 81% of them sleep with their cellphones next to them on the bed, and 74% check their cellphones immediately after waking up. Also, 97% of teens and 91% of 20-year-olds regularly use cellphones in the bathroom. These types of extreme behavior are often labeled as forms of technology addiction. Therefore, many experts think that young people need to become more aware of their cellphone use habits.

14번 대화를 듣고, 여자가 지불할 총 금액을 고르시오.

[Telephone rings.]

M: Good morning. Rush Print Shop. How can I help you?

W: Hi. This is Sandra Collins at Parker Publishing Company.

M: Oh, Ms. Collins. Did you get the samples of the invitation card I sent you?

W: Yes. They look great. We'd like to order five hundred copies of sample A.

Nyad gained national attention in 1975 by swimming 28 miles around New York's Manhattan Island in just under eight hours. At age 60, having not swum a stroke in decades, she began planning to swim from Cuba to Florida. Finally, on her fifth attempt, she became the first person to officially swim those 110 miles. Her swim broke Penny Palfrey's 2012 distance record for the Cuba to Florida swim. Now, she'll tell us about her life and her achievements. Please give a warm round of applause for Ms. Nyad.
